

Gleanings from Meetings

Stumbling forward, ever forward, I've attended two Montgomery County Civic Federation (MCCF) meetings during this Bugle period. In that time, I've also started a new job for the Montgomery County in its Department of Finance. As it turns out, this job had some relevance for my attendance at the MCCF meetings, although I could never have guessed at its significance ahead of time. The story unfolds in all its glory below.



March 12, 2018 MCCF Meeting Annual Presentation on the State of the County Environment

DANILA SHEVEIKO, MCCF Second Vice President's presentation was not encouraging as to 1) the quality of environmental protection efforts in Montgomery County, 2) the actual personal risk we all bear living here, and 3) the efforts made to reduce existing environmental risks to health, which were deemed as little more than window dressing. I certainly was ready to accept that more needed to be done on the environment, but the case that no progress had been made in one of the most progressive counties in the United States was not clearly presented. My attendance at the meeting was cut short, however, as I needed to leave relatively early. As I was gathering my things to go, the conversation turned sharply emotional and argumentative, with some less-than-complimentary descriptive nouns and adjectives. While I did find the verbal pyrotechnics somewhat amusing, I will say that the topic at hand was not, and I left with a genuine concern as to what was real and what was not as pertains to the environment in Montgomery County.

Pavilion and Party Reservations

One of the benefits of being a Bel Pre Recreational Association (BPRA) member is that you can reserve the Pool Pavilion for free. While you do need to supply a security deposit in advance, it is refunded after you use the pavilion. Do note: if you are have any guests who are not BPRA members, you need to pay the regular guest fee (\$2 per person for weekdays, \$3 per person for weekends). Guest fees must be paid by the member, and are not to be paid by any guest(s).

Please make your reservations early -- because (1) reservations generally are taken on a first come-first-served basis and (2) use of the pavilion or the pool with 10 or more guests normally requires approval at a meeting of the Board of Trustees. The Board usually meets only once a month. Now would be a good time to make your reservation!

Pool Passes

In mid May, all BPRA households should be receiving a note from our Pool Passes Coordinator, LOUISA HOAR. If, when you sent in your \$225 annual dues, you indicated that your choice was 2 season passes, then you should be receiving your 2 passes for the 2018 season. If you indicated that your choice was household admission, then you should receive a census form asking who lives in your household and a request for recent photos.





When you come to use the pool, be sure to bring and show your season pass at the front desk - if you requested season passes. If you requested household admission, then the staff at the front desk will check our photos collection.



Clean up - Mathew Henson Trail

Do you remember the wind storm, the worst of the year, when both schools, the metro and the federal government closed due to strong winds? Our neighborhood had the unfortunate coincidence of that day being our trash and recycling pickup day. Did you notice how your recycling bin was empty before the truck came to collect it? Your



recyclables ended up going into the storm drains on your street, where they were quickly washed into local streams. It was easy to see them all over the place along the boardwalk and bridges of the Matthew Henson Trail. SOMEBODY DO SOMETHING!!

Well, somebody did – the scouts and families of Pack and Troop 763, sponsored by the Strathmore Bel Pre Civic Association, and the scouts of local Girl Scout Troop 232. We covered the area behind Bel Pre Elementary School, picked up the "trash rafts" at the 2 bridges, and came back up the stream valley towards Rippling Brook Road, ending up cleaning around the storm-water pond where ducks and other birds like to nest.

We collected about 16 bags of loose trash, which is less than last year, but this trend is similar to other multi-year efforts in the area. As an area gets cleaner, it tends to stay cleaner and there is less trash that is deposited since trash collects trash. (You will notice the same effect with your sink and dishwasher. Put every dish straight into the dishwasher and the sink stays clear. As soon as the first dish is left in the sink, then all subsequent dishes will be piled up in the sink.)

However, this year we collected 5 times the amount of recyclables as we did last year, as a result of the fact that the 3 windiest days of the year all fell on Fridays when the cans were on the street. The single most common thing we picked up? Disposable water bottles accounted for about half the recyclables we found. They are light and easily airborne and become litter very quickly. The biggest difference? We picked up far fewer plastic bags. Studies of local streams have shown a 50-80% reduction in plastic waste as a result of the 5 cent plastic bag tax.



For many of the kids, this is their favorite activity of the year. They get to wander through the woods, under bridges, through the mud, using their outdoor voices. At the end, there is a pile of trash and then woods looked noticeably cleaner, and they unequivocally knew that their actions helped the environment. So, a very big thank you to everyone who has bought popcorn from a scout and to the many donations received from the community. The pack (elementary school age kids) needs about \$60 per scout to cover the cost of dues, awards, insurance, activities, and a subscription to the awesome *Boys Life* magazine. Many families cannot afford that, especially if they have more than one scout. Your donations and purchase of popcorn helps cover the cost for these scouts, who can participate in all that scouting offers them. Thanks also to Montgomery County Parks and Planning, who provides the supplies and picks up the trash.

THE BEAUTY OF SPRING BEECHES

How lucky we are to have so many beautiful beech trees nearby! Beeches (*Fagus grandifolia*), my favorite trees, are common on the slopes above Bel Pre Creek. Many are tall and venerable elders, with canopy too dense to allow much undergrowth. Where several beeches are close, they create a splendid open look of dappled glades and thick silvery trunks; spaces are pillared and vaulted like cathedral cloisters.

Scientific studies have proven that spending time in nature can reduce your stress hormones, lower your pulse rate, and improve your blood pressure. Even a small neighborhood park like ours beside the Henson Trail provides restful places to be apart from busy daily life.



Walking under beeches in early spring is just such a blessing. The air is mild, and scudding clouds drop short slanting showers that barely dampen the ground. Straight gray beech boles, streaked with



moisture, make me feel I am impossibly small and walking among stationary elephants. The trees' pewter colored branches are all tipped with dark new growth that ends in pointed amber flames of tightly furled leaf buds. I walk across netted roots on an amber carpet of the last generation of leaves. Amber to green to amber again. A beautiful progression.

By late April, the beeches' upper branches are golden-green crowns, while the lower leaves are still tightly held by the furled amber calyxes. Soon the leaves all burst forth, and the hill above the creek is a glory of tender soft green. The new leaves, fully out, are edged with fine pale hairs and creased like a partly folded fan. Beneath the trees lies a litter of cast off amber hulls.



Beeches are an essential part of our park's small forest. Gray rivulets of roots cascade down the slope, merging with and melting Into the earth, holding fast lest earth and tree slide together into the creek. Branches and roots capture rainfall, slowing its progress to the ground and retarding its loss. Old leaves and fallen branches contribute to uneven, spongy soil surfaces that divert and slow runoff on its way down to the creek.

Boughs shade the water and keep its temperature cooler on warm days.

On some warm day soon, do take a little time to sit on a beechroot bench by the creek and just relax. It's good for your health!

Updates from the Glenmont Exchange


The Glenmont Exchange gathers together businesses and community associations surrounding Glenmont. The Strathmore Bel Pre Civic Association is a Founding Member.

As an information exchange, Glenmont Exchange meetings are a useful way to get updates on developments in our area. Here are some updates from recent meetings.

Primrose Day Care Center

The new day care center proposed for the corner of Layhill Road and Queensgard Road, just across from the entrance to the Mid-County Recreation Center is progressing. A Planning Board hearing was held April 12th. The Staff development report can be found online at

The proposed Primrose School will be in a new 12,634 - square foot, one-story building with 11 classrooms on a 4.22 acre site. The facility will serve up to 200 children, with up to 32 employees onsite at any one time. All-day care will be available for children age six-weeks old to pre-Kindergarten age. Before and after school programs may be offered for students ages 5-12.

The applicant, Layhill Property LLC, plans to subdivide the property into two lots. The Primrose School will occupy one lot, with second one proposed as residential.

Two wetlands and their buffers largely dictate the proposed site design, which attempts to minimize their impacts. Twenty-five of the parking spaces will be reserved for short-term child drop-off and pick-up, with the remainder of the 52 parking are intended for the staff.

Due to the property's topography, the proposed building sits at a lower elevation than Layhill Road, such that its roof will be the most prominent feature seen from Layhill Road. The building is designed to be residential in character with sloping



roofs, a stone and brick façade, and windows with mullions.

13,000 square feet of fenced outdoor play area, covered with artificial turf, also are proposed. One outdoor play area will be for infants, two for early preschool-age, and one for preschool-aged children. A 6-foot-tall decorative iron fence will surround the west, east, and north sides of the play area. The play area on the south side of the building that faces the adjacent residential property will be enclosed by a semi-opaque vinyl fence. Retaining walls border most of the proposed parking and play areas.

Going all the way back to the community meetings for the Glenmont Master Plan, there has been a community clamor for better day care facilities in our area. The new Primrose Day Care Center will go a long way towards addressing those longstanding community desires.

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April 9, 2018 MCCF Meeting Montgomery County's Fiscal Year 2019 Operating Budget

Upon arrival at the meeting, I found in attendance Montgomery County Council Member NANCY FLOREEN, Council Staff member MARLENE MICHAELSON, and Director of Finance ALEX ESPINOSA, who also happens to be my new boss, as well as several candidates for Montgomery County Council, both Democrats and Republicans. Council Member FLOREEN gave an impassioned speech on the care and diligence that goes into the choices made in the county's budget each year, describing the efforts as

"very thorough work." She also delivered a sharp rebuke to the derogatory comments being made about waste and inefficiency in the budget, coming from candidates on both sides of the aisle, including some current county employees.

Mr. Espinosa then ran through the key elements of the county's \$5.6 billion recommended operating budget for fiscal year 2019. Nearly half of the budget (46.7%) is taken up by expenditure on public schools, whereas another 10.5% goes to public safety, 7.7% to other county government functions, another 7.7% to debt service, and 5.7% to health and human services, leaving 21.7% to be split up amongst a variety of other functions. The Montgomery County Taxpayers League next listed its views on all areas of the current and proposed budget for the County, quite often disagreeing with the premises and expenses of the budget.

Physical Facilities – Fixing and Improving

Plans for the physical facilities for the 2018 season (some before opening day and some after) include upgrading the security system, improving the underwater lighting, repainting the ceiling in the bathrooms, fixing the pool lane dividers, maintenance on the pavilion lighting, replacing the life guard chair decks, upgrading the pump room the children pool, upgrading the pool deck umbrellas, improving the system for cleaning the main pump room strainers, adjusting the parking lot gates, improved signage, getting

the snack bar operational, and repainting the basketball courts. Thank you to JOE MOELLER, KYE PAK, GREG MILLER, LAURA MILLER, BILLY RUPPERT, and all the other volunteers who make these happen. Thank you, as well, to the folks at Georgetown Aquatics, who manage day-to-day operations at the pool.

Pool Property Trees

In addition to having an almost 50-year-old community swimming pool, we also have 50-year-old trees that were planted while the pool was under construction. Last year, several neighbors of the pool indicated concern about the maintenance of the pool property along the property line. We have worked with, and continue to work with, those neighbors to identify specific problems. During 2017 we spent over \$15,000 (roughly 10% of the BPRA's annual budget) on maintenance of the areas along the fences.



This included removing dead trees and brush, removing vines, pruning existing trees, and starting to establish a clear corridor along the fence line. During 2018, we expect to be spending a comparable amount on these activities (as well as planting new trees further back from the fence line) and will continue to do this each year for the foreseeable future. Thank you TED BECHTOL for making this happen.



Long-term Planning

Looking beyond the current season, work continues on development of a long-term plan for our community's recreational facilities. Key questions being looked at include when did each of the major components of our facilities (including the pumps, the pool, the clubhouse, the pavilion, and the tennis courts) last have major renovation and what are their remaining life-expectancies?. As they reach their next major milestones, what are the likely costs to repair or replace or upgrade? Are we on good financial footing to meet these needs? Where should we go from here? KAREN PURDY is heading

up this enormous effort. Thank you to KAREN and to all the community members (current and past) who are helping put this together.


