Annual Yard Sale, Dolphin Dash Postponed



Due to the COVID-19 outbreak:

39th annual Summer Market and Yard Sale rescheduled to Saturday, **September 12**.

6th annual Dolphin Dash 5K rescheduled to the fall.

The 3rd annual Spring Thing was been cancelled, as has the May 30 Movie Night.

Meetings of the Bel Pre Recreational Association Board of Trustees and the Strathmore Bel Pre Civic Association Board of Directors are by teleconference. School Board candidates forums have been postponed to the fall. All of our public schools, libraries and recreation centers have been closed since March 16. Community events and gatherings of more than 10 people have also been prohibited by the Governor since March 16.



Will the pool open on May 23?

As this issue of *The Bugle* goes to press, we don't know the answer to that question. The Governor has set out a 3-stage plan for re-opening activities in the State, that might make it possible to open our community's pool on time, provided the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services (which licenses all community pools in the County) is OK with us going forward. So many IFs to enable us to arrive at a **May 23** opening.



Calendar Changes so Far (due to the current COVID-19 situation)

- May 9, The Spring Thing, including Shred-It, has been canceled.
 - IF the event is rescheduled, the BPRA and Civic Association will publish a new date.
- May 25, The Dolphin Dash 5K, has been postponed until later.
 - The new date will be established sometime this summer.
- May 30,The Summer Market and Yard Sale has been rescheduled for Saturday, September 12
 - o Now temporarily named the Fall Market and Yard Sale.
- May 30, The First Summer Movie, has been canceled.



While the BPRA and Civic Association currently have a host of other fun summer activities planned, including movies and concerts at the pool and the **Fourth of July** parade, the calendar will continue to evolve based on the COVID-19 situation. Calendar changes will be communicated on StrathmoreBelPre.org and through both the Community and Swim Team listservs.

Pool Opening and Hours (Please see StrathmoreBelPre.org for updates)

As of this writing, the COVID-19 situation is still evolving and we do not have sufficient information or guidance to definitively set a pool opening date. IF the pool opens on time, hours will be as follows:



May 23, May 24: noon to 9 pm

May 25 (Memorial Day): noon to 8 pm

May 26 to June 15*

Monday through Thursday: 3 pm to 8pm

Friday: 3 pm to 9pm Saturday: noon to 9 pm Sunday: noon to 8 pm

June 16* to August 30

July 4: noon to 6 pm

All other days: noon to 9 pm

August 31 to September 3: 3 pm to 8 pm

September 4: 3 pm to 9 pm

September 5 to 7 (Labor Day): noon to 9 pm

*Dates are based on the current last day of Montgomery County Public Schools, and are subject to change based on the school calendar.

Changes to Pool Hours

Change will be announced via signs posted at the pool, on StrathmoreBelPre.org, and through both the Community and Swim Team Listservs.

Pool Passes

The BPRA provides two options for pool access, Season Passes and Household membership.

Season Passes: if you selected "Season Passes" when you paid your annual assessment, you will receive 2 season passes in the mail before the pool opens. You must bring your pass (one per person) to the front desk to check in each time you visit the pool.



Household: if you selected "Household", did not select an option, or did not return the annual assessment form when you paid your assessment, you will be assigned a "Household" membership. To access the pool with a Household membership, you must have a current BPRA census form, listing all residents of your household and including a recent photo of all members listed, on file at the pool. Pool staff will check the photo rolodex for your information as you check in at the pool. Household memberships without appropriate information on file will be denied access to the pool until the information is provided.

New Residents

If you are a new resident or have signed up for the Household membership for the first time and have not received a census form to fill out by mid-May, please contact the BPRA's Pool Pass Coordinator, LOUISA HOAR at (301) 871-2954.

Please note, that if you have not paid your Annual Assessment or if your account is otherwise in arrears, you may not use the pool or other common property.

Three Season Scenarios

As of this writing, the Prince Mont Swim League (PMSL) plans to proceed with the 2020 season, which is very good news. What that season will look like is still to be determined. Several teams have already cancelled their seasons, which means that the league will need to reshuffle the divisions. For all of the other teams (including ours), season start dates will depend on when pools can open. Right now, we are planning for three possible scenarios:

- ↑ Abbreviated PMSL season, with three dual meets and Divisional championships (no All-Star meet)
- Intramural season, with practices, practice meets, and B meets

We hope to have more clarity by mid-May. Meanwhile, we are planning for the best case.

In Memoriam: Frank Corrigan

FRANCIS "FRANK" CORRIGAN passed away on April 21 at age 82. He is survived by his wife, CAROLE, and son, DAVID. The CORRIGANS were original owners in Strathmore Bel Pre.

Frank attended Providence College, Boston University, and George Washington University from which he received a doctorate. He also served at G.W.U. as an assistant professorial lecturer.

His area work career started at the U.S. Department of Education when it when it was part of Health, Education, and Welfare, and continued when Education was a separate department. At retirement, with 44 years of service, he was Deputy Director of the National Institute on Disability & Rehabilitation Research in the Department of Education.

Here in the Strathmore Bel Pre community, FRANK was an active community member. He was elected to the Bel Pre Recreational Association board for 1 term in 1978, became Vice-President in 1979, and then later, was elected to another term, where he served as President from 1984 to 1987. Frank joined the Strathmore Bel Pre Civic Association Board in 2008 and served through 2015. Frank served on the Governing Documents Committee of the Recreational Association from 2006 to 2007. He also wrote the "Gleanings from Meetings" column for *The Bugle*, from 2012 to 2015. While serving on the Civic Association Board, Frank was one of our community's representatives on the Montgomery County Civic Federation. FRANK was also an active member of the Montgomery County Taxpayers League.

FRANK was a very active member of St. Andrew the Apostle Church and served on the parish council. Also, he was a member of the team that recorded the church's charitable collections. In addition, he was very active as a hospice volunteer and often transported the sick to medical appointments.

I knew Frank personally as a friend, a neighbor, and a fellow civic activist. To sum up, he very truly earned this description: a very quiet Good Samaritan, and a very fine gentleman. He most certainly will be missed.

visible in the front of their homes rainbows! As you take your daily walk see how many you can spot.



10 Years for the SBPcivic Listsery!

The Civic Association created the SBPcivic listserv in March of 2010. The goal was to offer our members a new way to communicate. Before the listserv, the community's communication channels were limited to *The Bugle*, the bulletin board at the pool (at least in the summer), and direct mail.

The first message was sent on March 17, 2010. It was from me about the Green Neighborhood Challenge, an effort to take advantage of lower rates for wind-based electricity back then. Listserv members can read that first message for themselves, as well as all 7,765 messages sent through April 8, 2020, on the listserv's home page at https://groups.io/g/SBPcivic.



At first, listserv messages grew steadily each year before stabilizing between 850 to 1,000 per year. 2017 was an outlier with over 1,452 messages. I looked back through the messages but did not see any one event that could explain that surge.

As of April 8, 2020, the SBP Civic listserv has 261 members. The number of members has been stable between 240 and 270 since 2014. Most, but not all, Civic Association members join the listserv.

Over time, the listserv has filled several communication niches in our community. A favorite of mine has been tips about

maintenance issues for our community's homes. Its such a useful and specialized service since we all live in similar homes. Where else could Civic Association members go for such information? To see what I mean, try searching our messages for "aluminum wiring", or for your home's model (e.g., "Judson"), on the message search page at https://groups.io/g/SBPcivic/messages. We now have 10 years of community wisdom accumulated on our Civic Association listsery.

The listserv is also a place where we sell our used items (or give them away). It's a place to share information about our community, be it gatherings (movies, Spring Fling, concerts, Summer Market), development projects (Kaiser Permanente, Glenmont Metro Center, the arrival of Aldi's and Lidl), meetings (BPRA, SBPCA, annual police talk at the pool), news (a tree falls on Layhill, car break-ins, crime reports), or just plain fun (local nature, birthdays, girl scout cookie sales), and so much more.

In 10 years, the listserv has grown to be an indispensable part of Civic Association membership. It's a key part of how we communicate, share, and help each other.

We look forward to the next 10 years!



Nature's Solace

When I found this year's red-shouldered hawks' nest near Bel Pre Creek, it brought me great joy, as well as an added reassurance of a normal world.

Will we remember the solace of nature when we've survived this pandemic and emerged into a new normal?



This spring, our lives were upturned by a virus, an unthinking jumble of RNA. As we learn to counter the virus, can we remember the way we turned to the natural world, our refuge in stressful times? The lives of Earth's creatures are being altered by unthinking, or uncaring, humans. We can fix our virus problem pretty fast (by Earth standards) by keeping a turkey vulture's wingspan apart from each other, slowing the spread to buy time to make a vaccine. She called out (perhaps being more than ready for her mate to bring her a snack), but she stayed put, loyal to the next generation. She gives us a model of steward-ship, steadfastness, and hope. May we be as loyal to the next generations of the Earth.

Notes from the Glenmont Exchange


Since the last edition of *The Bugle*, Kaiser Permanente submitted new plans for their new health center at the Vitro site in Aspen Hill (next to Home Depot). You can review the site drawings and other application documents at these links:

A public hearing on these plans tentatively is scheduled for **June 25**, 2020.

Kaiser plans to tear down the entire Vitro building and build a new building closer to Connecticut Avenue, just behind the Dunkin Donuts store. The drawing mentions two phases. In Phase 2, Kaiser plans to expand the medical office building along Connecticut Ave. and build a parking garage at the back center of the lot fronting the Home Depot service road. You can see the planned configuration in this site drawing.





The proposed parking garage at the top of the picture, and the office building addition immediately to its right, seem planned for Phase 2 of the project.

Kaiser will also install rain gardens that should vastly improve drainage on the parking lot. Kaiser will install a new traffic signal at Connecticut Avenue and Aspen Hill Road to assist pedestrians and vehicles crossing Connecticut Avenue.

The entrance along Aspen Hill Road will be restricted to employees and emergency vehicles, controlled by a gate. The main entrance will use the Connecticut Ave. driveway, shared with Home Depot. A new traffic signal is also planned for that entrance. Since the site is vacant today, any redevelopment will have some traffic impact. However, the traffic study submitted with the other plans conclude that redevelopment will result in "minor increases in delay and queue times" and that both planned phases "pass the Motor Vehicle Adequacy Test with signal timing optimization at the Connecticut Ave/Aspen Hill Rd. intersection."

There are literally dozens of documents and hundreds of pages detailing plans for the site. Go to the links for an in-depth view of Kaiser's redevelopment plans.

UnPaid Assessment Late Fees

Payments made after March 31 are subject to a \$30 late fee, 6% per annum (\$1.50/month) interest, and collection costs. Access to the pool and related facilities is not permitted for households with accounts in arrears. The BPRA is legally obligated to collect the annual assessment even if the pool does not open.

- •Use of the pavilion or the pool with 10 or more guests normally requires approval at the monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees (normally the first Tuesday of the month).



Resurfacing the Neighborhood

Our neighborhood streets are getting a new look, resurfacing. No doubt you have noticed the Montgomery County street repair vehicles working on our streets for the upcoming road resurfacing of the Georgian Forest area. This pavement system preservation project employs longterm strategies to preserve and enhance the physical and operating conditions of the roadway system.

Background

Remodeling, Inc

The Montgomery County Department of Transportation (MCDOT) Division of Highway Services (DHS) maintains nearly 5,200 lane miles of streets and highways in the county's transportation system. MCDOT concluded a complete condition inventory of all County roads, identifying and rating the condition of each. This new assessment survey, updated every two years, has enabled the development of county-wide roadway repair strategies based on a formula-based objective rating system.

Overall, the pavement conditions in our community were generally rated as fair, with some areas described as needing more attention. This rating meets the criteria for the County's Residential Roadway Resurfacing Program, consisting of full-depth (base repair) patching followed by hot mix asphalt (HMA) overlay.

Schedule

This project was scheduled to begin in the spring of 2020 and will take four to six weeks to complete, weather and other operational requirements permitting. Work hours will be between 7 am and 7 pm, Monday through Friday. Generally, the work will proceed as follows:

- Conduct survey MCDOT inspectors identify areas of pavement that, prior to resurfacing, may require full depth patching or other marked by white paint.
- Full-Depth Patching Full-depth patching restores the pavement's structural integrity and capacity to support vehicle loads. The areas of distressed pavement marked by the MCDOT inspectors are removed and replaced by new asphalt pavement. The final paving of the road will cover these patched areas.
- ❖ Pavement milling Milling/grinding off the edges of the existing pavement allows the new pavement to match the level of the existing curbs, etc., and restores the proper roadway cross-section to improve ride-ability and drainage. The new pavement is intended to provide a smoother ride and assure positive drainage.
- ❖ Paving with hot mix asphalt Asphalt delivered to the site in dump trucks. The hot material is transferred into the hopper of an asphalt paving machine such as the one depicted in the photo. The paving machine places the hot asphalt in a uniform thickness and compaction.
- ❖ Replace roadway lane markings Permanent lane markings, if existing prior to paving, will be remarked shortly after all paving operations have been completed.



IMPACTS

Access to residences should be available, however minor delays may be experienced as workers restrict traffic from freshly placed hot mix asphalt. Generally speaking, this work is best characterized as noisy and disruptive. MCDOT will take steps to mitigate any inconveniences.

Parking Restrictions and Towing

Street paving will necessitate short-term parking restrictions. The intent is to maintain continuous traffic at all times utilizing lane closure or alternating one-way traffic patterns. However, minor traffic delays and brief daily road closures may be experienced as flaggers manually direct traffic safely through the construction zone. Signs will be posted identifying restrictions. Should the Police tow your vehicle, contact the police non-emergency number (301) 279-8000.

Please note:

Paving, resurfacing and patching projects are seasonal activities, suspended from roughly November to March/April. Because of the COVID-19 event, current paving timeframes may slide into May.

Libraries are Closed

Due to the COVID-19 outbreak, the Aspen Hill Library – and all Montgomery County libraries – is closed indefinitely. On March 12, the County Government announced that all libraries (and recreation centers) would be closed effective Monday, March 16.



Originally scheduled to reopen on March 28, the County Executive (on March 25) extended the closures to April 24. On April 15, the Department of Public Libraries and the County Recreation Department announced that their facilities would now remain closed indefinitely.

Keep Your Library Books – No Fines (for now)

The Library Department is asking that people not use the book drops to return books until the libraries reopen. All deadlines for holds and overdue books will be extended to a week after the libraries reopen.

Aspen Hill Library cancelled programs and events include:

- Property Tax Workshop originally scheduled for March 22.
- The Aspen Hill Library Advisory Committee meeting scheduled for April 6.
- The Spring Used Book Sale scheduled for May 2. (The next book sale
- is scheduled for October 24).
- Knitting and Crocheting Club meetings on the first and third Fridays of each month (3 to 4:30 pm).

Postponed Events

- School Board Candidates Forums (originally scheduled for March 12 and 26, then rescheduled for April 13) will be held in the fall, before the General Election.
- Annual General Membership meeting of the Friends of the Aspen Hill Library (originally scheduled for May 30) has been rescheduled to Saturday, August 29. The meeting will be held by teleconference.
 The annual luncheon has been cancelled.

Though the Aspen Hill Library building (and all the other County libraries) is closed, these library services remain open to the public:

While all the brick-and-mortar branch libraries are closed, the County Library Department does have a "virtual branch" that is providing real-time storytimes, yoga classes, and much more.
