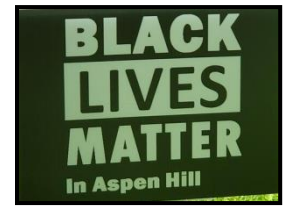

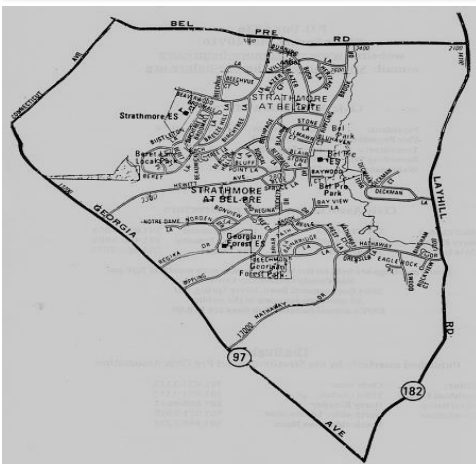

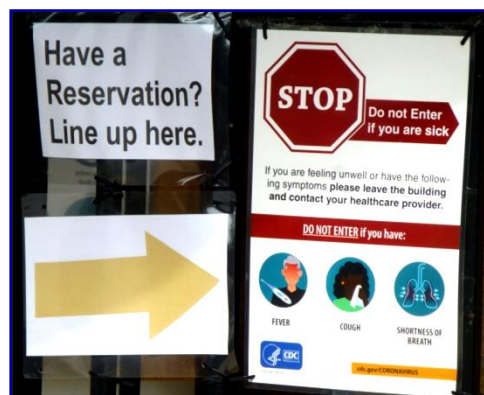

Thank you to Committee Chair NANCY BECHTOL and the Emergency Response and Planning Committee for planning and developing the procedures for the fall meetings.



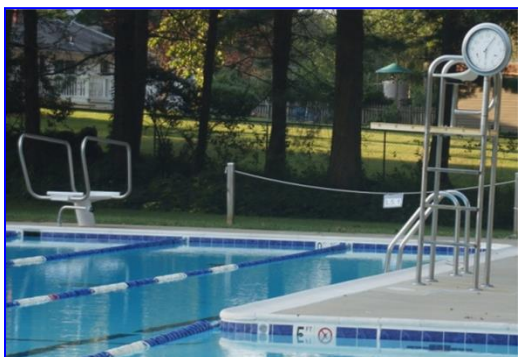
Explore Zoom – November 12, 7:30 pm via Zoom

Helping with Food Insecurity

If you have looked at the food insecurity maps for the area, you will notice that the Aspen Hill area appears bright red with high food insecurity. Scouts were there to help. Our community partner (and meeting location) is St. Mary Magdalene Episcopal Church (the church behind Giant and next to the pet cemetery), who partnered with Misa Magdalena and the Arcadia Foundation to distribute boxes of fruits and vegetables to people in the community who are financially impacted by COVID-19. Each week, from late July through August, boy scouts from Troop 763 (sponsored by the Strathmore Bel Pre Civic Association) unloaded approximately 250 - 300 boxes of fresh fruit and veggies, along with pantry staples such as brown rice, dried black beans and canned tuna or chicken.

Personal hygiene items such as soap, toothpaste, shampoo, etc., also are welcome. NO glass containers, please! Just place your donations in a bag or box, and put them by your front door by 9:30 am, on Saturday, **November 14, 2020**.

Feed the Birds

When a friend asked me where goldfinches go on migration, I laughed and said, “To my birdfeeders.”

Goldfinches seem to disappear in autumn because they molt into drab attire. Males and females both turn brownish-gray, highlighted by pale yellow throats. Don't be too quick to tidy your gardens; goldfinches will help clean up all the seeds. Growing native plants helps to feed our birds all year.



Our backyard birds will soon be joined by migrants from the north that spend the winter here. If you want to help sustain avian diversity, it's time to put out bird feeders.

Food and Feeders

Being a good feeder of birds is not just about buying a good bird-feeder. Offer a variety of seed and suet in different feeders for different eaters. Avoid packages of mixed seed with lots of tiny round millet seeds—much of it will be wasted. Don't feed bread crumbs—they mold fast and provide poor nutrition.



Black-oil sunflower seed: It's the odds-on favorite with most backyard birds. It works well in tube, hopper, and platform feeders. Don't let the shells drift into a garden, as they are toxic to many other plants. Either sweep them up, or buy the hulled sunflower seed. It's extremely popular! You'll see cardinals, titmice, house finches, woodpeckers, blue jays, sparrows, chickadees, mourning doves, juncos, and of course grackles and starlings.

Nyjer seed: It's often called “thistle” but the seeds come from an African daisy. Offer these tiny black seeds in feeders that have small perches or require the bird to hang upside-down. American

goldfinches love nyjer. If you're lucky, you might even get a visit from a pine siskin. One rough winter a common redpoll found my nyjer feeder, a “life bird” for me.

Peanuts: You can scatter whole peanuts (jays or squirrels will love them) or hang a wire mesh feeder holding shelled peanuts, or mix them in with other seed. My peanut feeder is a favorite with blue jays, woodpeckers, wrens, chickadees, and titmice.



Suet: The square blocks are bird magnets. Great for woodpeckers all year round. In our yard, we have northern flickers, plus downy, hairy, and red-bellied woodpeckers, just about any day. In summer, our local catbird clamors for suet. In winter, our local mockingbird tries to claim it. The blocks come in different “flavors.” I haven't noticed much difference in popularity.

Water

Water is especially important in winter, when puddles and small streams are frozen. Our birdbath is popular all year; in winter it's vital for birds. I plug in a birdbath heater, but you can also buy a heated birdbath. Birds are there every hour, every day. Sometimes they're lined up, taking turns. Robins are especially grateful.



Squirrels

Squirrels will be an issue! I once hung a wooden feeder in a tree. Squirrels gobbled the seed and then shredded the feeder. Place your feeders six feet from anywhere squirrels can reach—they are Olympic-quality jumpers. If your feeders are pole-mounted, use a baffle on the pole. If you have a great spot for a feeder but squirrels can reach it, try safflower seed, as squirrels will mostly leave it alone. Or buy a “squirrel-proof” feeder; their antics as they try to foil it will be your winter entertainment.

Help with info

The Cornell Lab of Ornithology (allaboutbirds.org) is just what its name asserts. For local expert advice and plentiful supplies, visit the Backyard Naturalist in Olney (thebackyardnaturalist.com) or the Audubon Naturalist Society in Chevy Chase (anshome.org). Both stores have curbside pickup.

Your reward

Feeding birds is not effortless. And it's not cheap, either: 25 pounds of hulled black-oil sunflower is not “tuppence a bag.” But you'll find buying the seed and suet, cleaning the feeders, and keeping them filled is worth it. Watch a cardinal's scarlet flash in a snowy tree, listen to the cheerful trill of a Carolina wren, catch a nuthatch's upside-down act. You're making winter easier for them, while they make it beautiful for you.

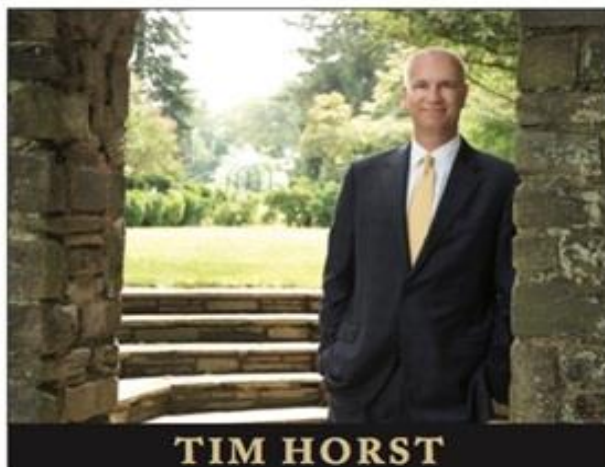

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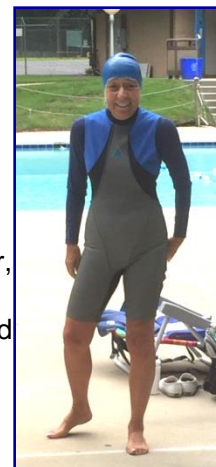

Aspen Hill Post Office Cleanup

On August 26th 2020, NANCY FEY posted a message to the Bel Pre Civic Association listserv commenting on the rather shabby appearance of the Aspen Hill Post Office. She remembered that Strathmore Be Pre (SBP) community volunteers had cleaned up the grounds on a previous occasion. RITA VAUGHT responded, stating that she had visited the branch that day and noticed it was seriously in need of a cleanup. A couple was there pulling weeds.

The cleanup idea came up during a meeting with representatives of the USPS, held at the pool June 20, 2017, regarding community issues with the post office. One of the complaints concerned the outside appearance of Aspen Hill branch facility. The Silver Spring postmaster at that time, GABRIEL HAMILTON, said that the USPS staff had no funds to do more. It was suggested that our community members would volunteer to assist in a cleanup effort. As a result, I met with DENEEN TAYLOR, USPS Director of Communications, and organized the cleanup held on August 5th, 2017. BEN & AUDREY HAWLEY, BOB TROLL, and I were the members of the community who worked with several USPS personnel to complete the work. It took us about 2½ hours. We planned to repeat the effort in the spring of 2018, but the personnel at the post office moved to other positions and that effort never got off the ground.

Cleanup in 2020 or 2021 ?

As a result of the August 2020 listserv communications, quite a few community members volunteered to participate in a cleanup this year. On August 8th I contacted the Aspen Hill Branch Supervisor and offered our services. She told me she would pass this offer on to the Branch Maintenance Manager. He got back to me later that day and told me that he appreciated the offer but he would not need outside help. The department had gotten a little behind in the previous weeks, but they were catching up.

I told him to keep my phone number and to contact me if they should change their mind. I also told him that we would contact him again in the spring to repeat the offer. Several of the neighbors stated they would be happy to help if we could arrange such a spring cleanup.

The Aspen Hill Library (our community's big free library) remains largely closed to the public. There are some services now being provided through the Library, and hopefully more will come before too long.



Borrowing Books

The Library is open for borrowing books. Use the Library catalog to select your books and place them on hold. You also can contact the Library and request books, even asking for the staff to select books for you, such as Halloween mysteries, the latest biographies, or cookbooks for the Fall, or lots of beginning reader books. After placing your books on hold, you will get a notification when they are ready for you. Use the Library system's appointment system to pick your time to go to the Library's foyer and get your books, aka "curb-side" service. When you can come to the foyer at the main entrance to the library, where your books will be in a bag with your name on it.

No Fines

Adult books still have due dates, but no fines will accrue. Materials are quarantined after they are returned to be safe for the staff (and you) to handle them. Children's books that circulate also have no fines.

Take and Make

Aspen Hill Library (with help from the Friends of the Aspen Hill Library) is one of just a few public libraries in Montgomery County that are piloting a Take and Make program. Make an appointment and you can come to the Aspen Hill Library and pick up a kit of fun projects for kids. Some Take and Make kits are Science themed, while others are grab bags. Gardens

The inside of the Library may be closed, but the gardens around the Library are open for everyone to come over and enjoy. The County cuts the grass at the Library, but it's the Aspen Hill Garden Club that maintains the gardens – including watering and weeding. The Garden Club now has labeled various plants in the gardens.

Piebald Deer Sightings

During our regular morning walks along the Mathew Henson trail, we see plenty of wildlife, e.g., turtles, deer with their young ones prancing around, and different species of birds. When my husband happened to walk alone one day, he also saw 3 snakes sunbathing in the creek near the steps leading to the trail from Rippling Brook Drive (ugh).



However, the highlight of those walks has been sightings of piebald deer in the wooded area near the trail ending at Alderton Road. On six separate occasions we have been very fortunate, and simply delighted, to see these two piebald fawns.



A Google search on "piebald deer" produced the following information:

- A piebald deer is usually characterized by a lack of pigment in patches around its body; those areas appear white, in addition to the normally white areas like the belly, underneath the tail, around the nose, ears, and throat patch.
- It is reported that less than 2% of deer are piebalds, which is rare but still more common than completely albino whitetails. Piebaldism is a recessive trait; it is believed that both parents must carry the recessive gene for there to be a chance that they will produce piebald fawns.

➤ Unlike the albino deer, which has pink eyes, a pink nose, and pinkish hooves, piebald deer have normal brown eyes and nose with black hooves like a normal whitetail. Their coloration is due to a rare inherited genetic variation (defect) that affects less than one percent of the white-tailed deer population.

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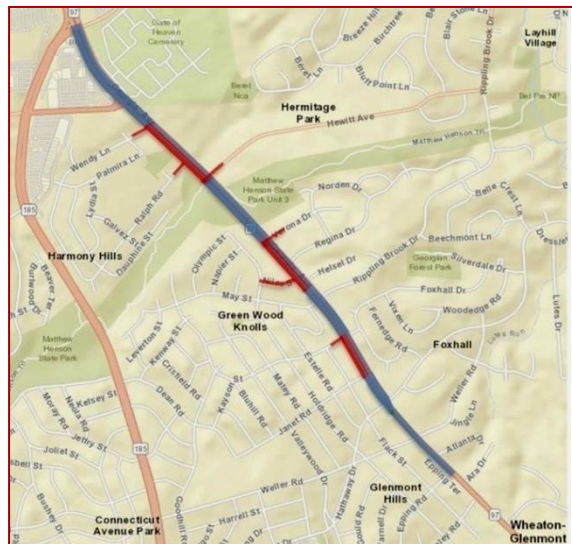
Notes from the Glenmont Exchange

Georgia Avenue Update

Over the summer, we received updates from the State Highway Administration (SHA) and the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC) on the status of the water main replacement and resurfacing along Georgia Avenue.

As of September 14, 2020, WSSC planned to complete the water main replacement in late October. WSSC also committed that “All the roads that we disturbed during this project will receive a curb to curb mill and overlay. On Georgia Avenue, we will be restoring the side of the road our trench is in from the curb to the median. WSSC expects to complete the entire project by “mid-to-late November”, weather permitting.



Neither WSSC nor SHA have responded to the questions about why SHA resurfaced Georgia Avenue in Aspen Hill the year before the WSSC project began, even though the WSSC’s plans had already been publicized. WSSC in one letter said that Georgia Avenue was last resurfaced on 2012. We all know that is inaccurate as we all “enjoyed” the 2018 repaving in the Aspen Hill area.

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20906 and COVID-19: Update

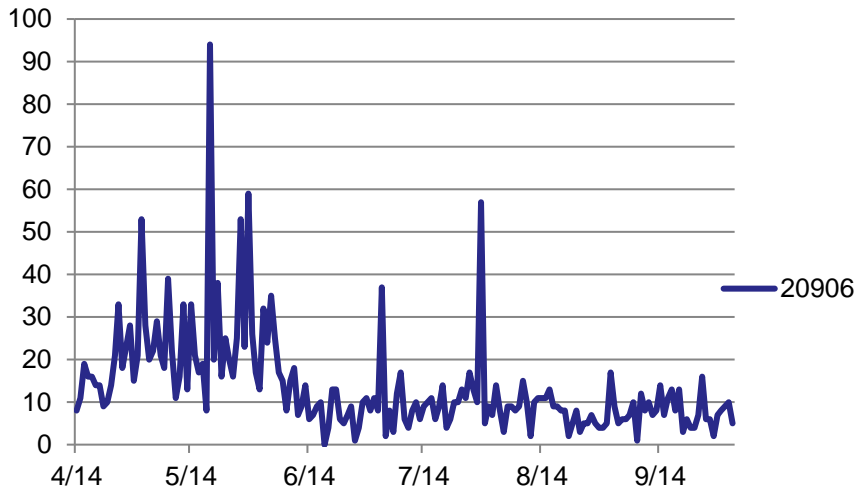
Since June 11, the number of new COVID-19 cases in zip code 20906 has plateaued at roughly 2 to 12 per day (other than spikes on July 3 and 29). We're definitely doing better than we were in the spring, when we were running 20-30 or more new cases a day, but we're not out of the woods yet.

Montgomery County has been publishing a daily cumulative tally of COVID-19 cases by zip code (from the Maryland Health Department) since mid-April.

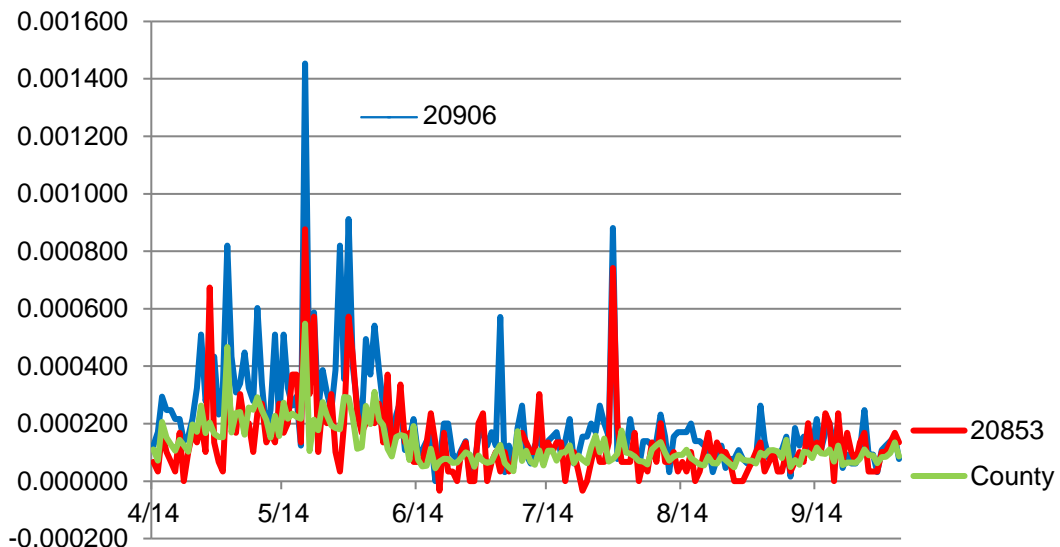
Large Zip Code

As mentioned in the June *Bugle*, zip code 20906 is a large zip code. It extends from Glenmont to just south of Olney. On the west it's bounded by Connecticut Avenue and then Georgia Avenue. On the east it goes to Northwest Branch Park. 20906 includes all of Strathmore Bel Pre, as well as Leisure World, Georgian Forest, Foxhall, Harmony Hills, Layhill Village, and other communities.

New reported COVID-19 cases in 20906




According to ZipDataMaps, zip code 20906 has a population of 64,696. By comparison Montgomery County's population is listed as 971,777, and zip code 20853 – just to the west of us (covering the rest of Aspen Hill) has a population of 29,673. This makes zip code 20906 one of the largest zip codes (by population) in the state. By dividing the number of COVID-19 cases reported by the population figures, we can compare the per capita results for Montgomery County, 20906, and 20853:



New reported COVID-19 cases per capita

In the spring, our zip code was consistently running a higher per capita rate of new cases than the county or our sister zip code 20853. As the summer progressed, the three rates have been converging.

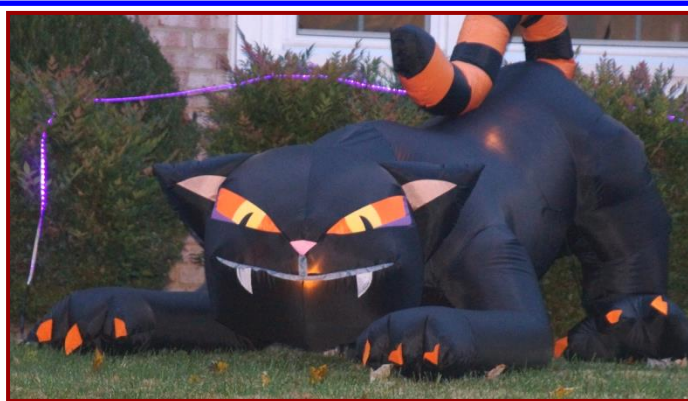

The Maryland Department of Health began publicly reporting the number of resident and staff cases and deaths for each individual nursing home, assisted living facility, and group home (with 10 or more residents) weekly since April 29. Within zip code 20906, the following facilities were listed as having one or more COVID-19 cases:

Aspenwood Senior Living Community	12	2	17	7
Bedford Court	31	0	6	2
Bel Pre Health Care Center	11	0	52	4
JK House of Grace	7	0	14	1
Layhill Center	7	0	19	7

Since the report in the June *Bugle*, this represents an increase at Aspenwood of 9 staff cases, 2 staff deaths, 7 resident cases, and 3 resident deaths. Bedford Court experienced 21 additional staff cases and 2 additional resident cases. Layhill Center had 4 more staff cases.
